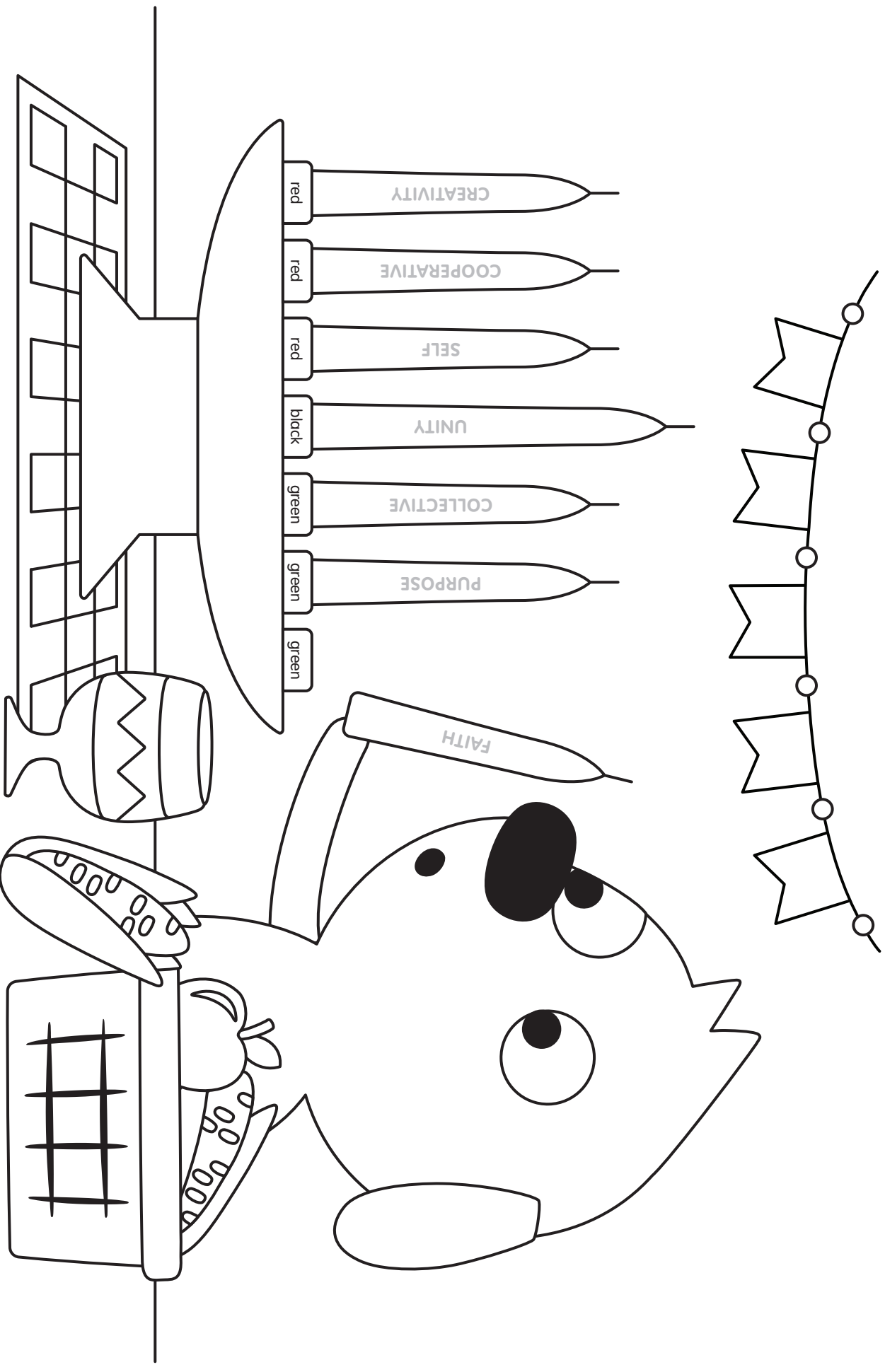


Meet Jerzy, age 5 & Jre, age 8

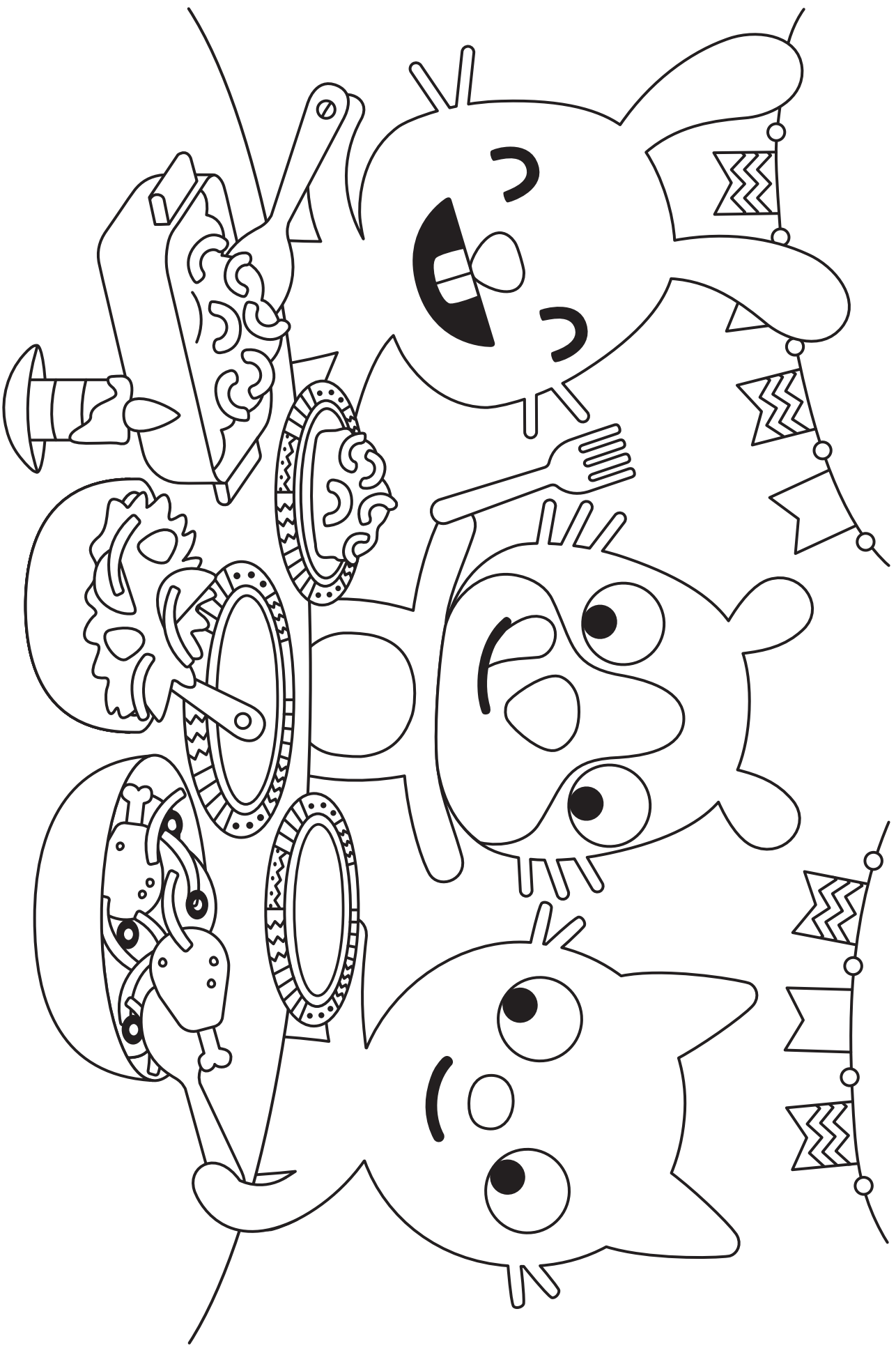
Jerzy and Jre celebrate Kwanzaa every year with their family. Their favorite part of Kwanzaa is the tiny gifts they receive.

Black, red and green candles are used for specific meanings.

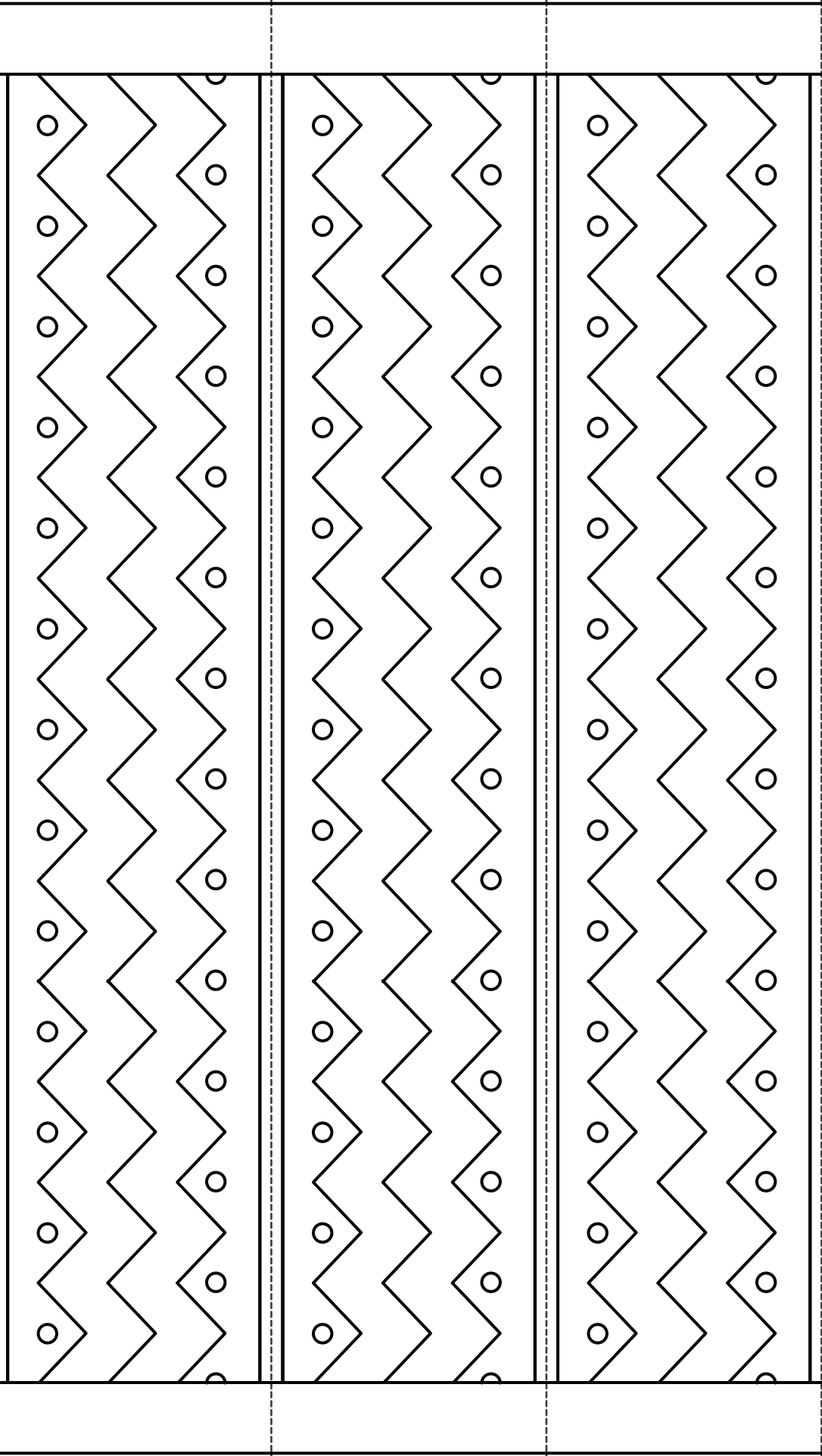
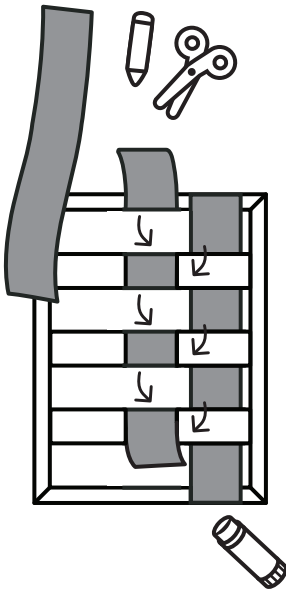


On the final night of Kwanzaa, family and friends gather for the karamu feast, a big potluck-style dinner.



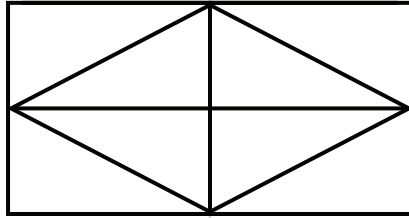
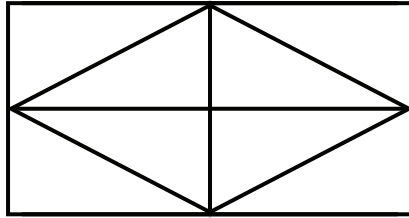
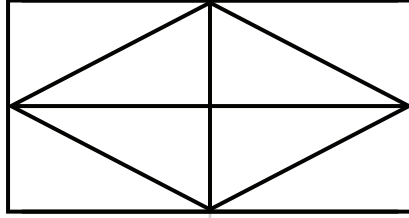
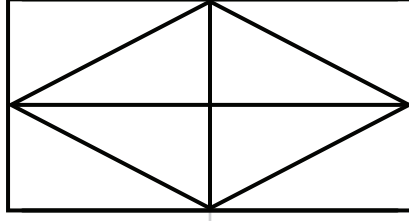
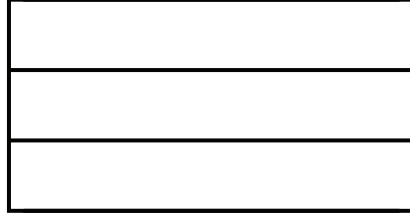
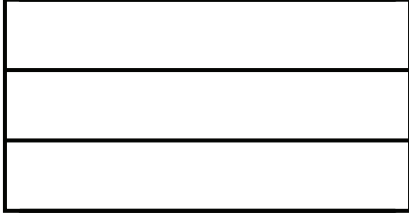
DIY Mkeka

A mkeka (pronounced muh-kay-kuh) is a traditional woven straw or fabric mat that symbolizes a strong foundation. The kinara, unity cup, and fruits and veggies are just some of the items placed on this mat. **Instructions:** Color in and cut along the dotted lines. Weave all the strips over and under the vertical cuts on the mat, and glue the ends in place to complete your mkeka!
